Class 1985 - 1988 and 1986 - 1989



The Ministry of Education initiated AEP in 1984 with the aim to stretch the potential of academically able students with artistic talents and, thereby, cultivate individuals who would be able to provide leadership favourable to the cultivation of the arts in Singapore. AEP was offered at four select schools and the Convent of the Holy Infant Jesus Toa Payoh (CHIJ TP) was one of them.

In 1985, the first batch of AEP students to enter CHIJ TP walked through the spotless, concrete-columned entrance, wide-eyed and excited. They bonded quickly and, soon, were working with various mediums and techniques under the tutelage of their teachers, Mrs. Auyong and Mr. Wilson. They even had access to their own firing kiln and dark room. It was 1985 and film photography was it.

Fast forward 30 years, AEP has produced many highly talented, well-rounded individuals. AEP encouraged students to experiment, innovate, and


