To start the day...


Once upon a time there was a shy and quiet octopus. He nearly always went about on his own because, although he wanted to have lots of friends, he was too shy.






As soon as he was gone, all the fish who had been hiding came and congratulated the octopus for being so brave.


What do we learn from the story?

Will be articulated and explained especially to lower primary students.


Please help us to support your child to get used to the rules and expectations so that we can be a community with shared expectations about behaviour.

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

1) RELATING TO OTHERS



Build your child's interpersonal skills

- Model the use of polite phrases
 - "Hello! My name is... what is your name?"
 - "May I go to the toilet please?"
- Provide opportunities for your child to share and <u>take turns</u> during playtime with other children.
- Teach him/her coping stratgies to enable him/her to manage emotions.



2) DEVELOPING GOOD HABITS



Guide your child to do the following independently. Set routines to help them manage.

- Use of toilet
- Wash hands correctly
- Dress themselves
- Buy food at the canteen
- Pack their bag
- Take care of their belongings (labelled)
 Eg Wallet, water bottles, lunch boxes



3) NURTURING POSITIVE LEARNING ATTITUDES



Developing the right learning attitude

You can encourage your child to:

- Ask questions about their experiences and the world around them.
- Express their thoughts and feelings about and discuss what can be done if they have worries.
- Practice independence and responsibility (*Bring the materials required each day, learn from their mistakes, etc).



4) CREATING A CONDUCIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT AT HOME



Set up a conducive home environment at home

- Encourage your child to learn English and their Mother Tongue, through picture books, language games or songs.
- Set aside space in your home where your child can read and finish their homework.
- Ensure that your child has both English and Mother Tongue story books to read in school and at home.

Mon & Tue – MT storybook Wed, Thur, Fri – EL storybook



A CARING AND CONDUCIVE LEARNING ENVIRONMENT IN SCHOOL



Discipline and Care

- When your child is unwell or hurt himself/herself, the school staff will inform the parent to bring the child home.
- If there is any behavioural issue, form teachers will work with the parents to educate the child.
- When your child makes a mistake, use it as an opportunity for the child to learn and grow in the areas of responsibility and maturity.


Arrival Plan
