


STELLAR stands for 'Strategies for English Language Learning and Reading'.

Reading Printed Stories

Watching animated stories (e-books)

Helps to develop the "mental muscles" in a child, by allowing him to form mental images and reflect on a story's meaning.	The children were struggling to keep track with what was happening in the fast-moving animation.
Called the "serve and return" model of interaction between a parent and a child, this takes place when a parent reads a book with a child – turning pages, pointing at pictures, talking about the story. This "serve and return" also develops reasoning, thinking and even creativity in a child.	Hinders the language development and reading comprehension skills in a child.
Allows children to think critically and develop human skills like empathy through deep reading.	Hampers the development of children's ability to think critically and be empathetic.
Children grow up to enjoy reading and read for the sheer pleasure of it.	Children who read only on screens are less likely to enjoy reading and less likely to have a favourite book.

READ

- Reading with children develops their language and literacy skills. Words can be found all around us, for example, on cereal boxes and advertisements.
- Recognising such environmental print allows children to differentiate text from pictures at an early age by reading the words in their immediate surroundings.

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


