Which of our school values, PRIZE, helped you on your path to success?


The main values that strike a chord with me would definitely be Integrity and Empathy.



Which of our school values, PRIZE helped you on your path to success?







An interview with Aryan Munish and Srikar Teja from Class 4E6 2019

How do you think the values and skills learned in your respective CCAs have helped you in your schoolwork?



How do you think your CCA and leadership experiences in school have helped you?


What do you hope to achieve in life? What are your aspirations?

When Sylvia Low, 1E4 received the Edusave Merit Bursary and the Edusave Good Progress Award back in January 2020, she did not consider keeping the award money to buy her favourite fantasy genre books. Instead, she used the \$400 to buy face masks for some 1,500 children from low-income families on her own accord during the coronavirus pandemic. For her good deed, she was interviewed by the Straits Times and Class 95 so that other people will be inspired by her to help others during times of crisis.

What inspired you to do this for the children?

I was inspired by my parents, who had taken part in fund raising for the people of Wuhan in China during the early days of the coronavirus outbreak. I was also inspired by the school community service events that I've taken part in previously. From these experiences, I realised that some families lacked the means to purchase daily essential items for themselves, so I am sure they would need help to buy items for their children. Since the Covid-19 pandemic was starting to spread around the world, including Singapore, I thought buying masks would be the most direct way to help these children.

How did you go about doing the kind act? How did the children react?

I asked my parents and they suggested that I write to our Mayor Dr Maliki who was the one who presented the prize award to me. The Mayor and the officers were really helpful. They helped me to identify the families with the help of community partners such as CDAC@Bedok, My First Skool@18

Marine Terrace and WeCare@MarineParade. The items were delivered with the help of the South East Community Development Council. I felt really happy and satisfied after seeing the children receive the masks and in return, I received notes of appreciation from them, which really touched me.

How do you feel about the interview with the Straits Times and Class 95?

I felt honoured, but nervous at the same time. I have never been interviewed or given a speech in front of an audience before. It was definitely a new and exciting experience for me.

What other kinds of community service activities can teenagers like you, take part in to help the community?

I think we can do many small kind deeds every day. Even picking up a piece of rubbish and throwing it away is community service. When we feel empathy for others, it is easy for us to do something kind for them. I hope when we are free from the coronavirus, we can visit nursing homes to keep the old folks company or help clean the premises. We can also collect unwanted items, clean and pack them, and then, deliver them to the homes of needy Singaporeans. I think my classmates and I will benefit from doing community service together. Apart from strengthening our bonds, we get to do something nice for others.

What was the process like in the lead-up to the award?

I was being shortlisted and contacted by the organiser, Halogen Foundation, after my teacher submitted a write up about me. The selection is a three-stage process which started in April this year, when I had to submit a one-minute video about my perspective of leadership. After that, I moved on to a panel interview by the upper management of Halogen Foundation. Finally, there was a five-hour long Leadership Trial with other applicants of the award. Since having a physical event was impossible, it had to be held online which was challenging as there was a lack of a physical connection with other leaders. Fortunately, all the participants were proactive and all of us felt as if we were physically together. What do you think were your attributes and contributions that led you to attain the award?



Student Leadership Framework

With a structured and comprehensive four-year student leadership development programme named the Pegasus Programme, students will acquire the necessary knowledge, skills and values through a continuum of workshops, seminars and camps so that they can serve the school, lead their school mates and excel in their pursuit in life. They also go through training to learn the Leadership Challenge Model developed by Kouzes and Posner and apply the Five Practices of Exemplary Leadership in school, namely Model the Way, Enable Others to Act, Challenge the Process, Inspire a Shared Vision and Encourage the Heart.

Leadership qualities are developed in a tiered system in PRSS. All Pasirians will go through CCE modules on self-leadership to allow them to develop leadership from within. Selected students will also be given opportunities to lead their class or CCAs. At the next level, our student councilors carry out leadership roles to serve the entire school population. There are also opportunities where our students embark on external projects to reach the pinnacle of the tiered system to demonstrate global leadership.


